#### FOND DU LAC RESERVATION HISTORY

The Fond du Lac Band of Chippewa Indians is one of the six bands comprising the Minnesota Chippewa Tribe. As the Chippewa bands moved into the Arrowhead region of Minnesota in the late 17th century, the Fond du lac Band settled near the western extremity of Lake Seperior. (The name "Fond du Lac" means extremity or end of lake; waiek-wa-kitchigami). The prinicple settlement of the Band is believed to be several miles up the St. Louis River from its mouth on Lake Superior. From this encampment, the Band had easy access to the wild rice beds along the river and to the Lake Superior fishery. The area occupied by the Fond du Lac Band stretched north along the shore to the county of the Grand Portage Band. Just how far the Fond du Lac Band ventured to the south and west is difficult to determine, but it is probable that its members interfaced with other Chippewa at Sandy Lake, near Mille Lacs, and along the St. Croix River.

The location of the Fond du Lac Band's main settlement meant that it faced the vanguard of white exploration and settlement. As early as 1783, records reveal that the Band was ravaged by smallpox. Also in those early years, the area became important as a fur trade center and jumping-off point for expeditions to the west.

The Fond du Lac Band was party to the principle treaties in the first half of the 19th centruy and its territory was used as a settlement area for removed Wisconsin Chippewa. By the Treaty of September 30, 1854, the Fond du Lac Band ceded its territory in the Arrowhead portion of Minnesota and received a reservation of about five townships of rolling timberlands near the present city of Cloquet, bounded on the north and east by the St. Louis River. Subsequent to the 1854 treaty, the Band confronted two efforts with respect to removal, once in 1872 (no results), and again in 1885 through Nelson Act and its aftermath.

Although some Fond du Lac Band members did remove to White Earth Reservation, the vast majority chose to remain and select allotments on the 1854 Reservation. This treaty allocated 100,000 acres to be used by the Fond du Lac Reservation Band members for allotments and this acreage was not to be exceeded.

The Reservation may be reached by traveling on U.S. Highway 2 and U.S. Highway 210 which run east and west, and State Highway 33 which crosses the Reservation from north to south. Railroad and busline services are availabel; however, the closest depot for the railroad and truck service is in Duluth, 30 miles away. The bus depot is within five miles of the Reservation.

Quoquet, adjacent to the Reservation, is the major trade center for the Reservation and county. Duluth, with a population of over 100,000 serves as a major trade center for northeastern Minnesota.

As previously stated, the reservation has a total of 100,000 acres. 4,253 acres belong to the Tribe, 17,114 acres are individual Indian allotted lands, and 78,633 acres are non-Indian owned. The Reservation was established by the Treaty of October 30, 1854 (10 Stat. 1109), and the Indian Reorganization Act of 1934.

Approximately 19,000 acres of the Reservation are classified as forest land with the balance classified as agricultural and other types of land. Lakes and streams are scattered intermittently throughout the Reservation.

According to the preliminary 1980 Census report on Reservation population, there are 3,402 residents, 1,400 of which are Fond du Lac enrollees. An additional 2,700 Indian people are reported to reside within a 30 mile radius adjacent to the Reservation.

There are no Federal employees of the Bureau of Indian Affairs stationed at the Fond du Lac Reservation.






#### THE EAGLE

The pre-schoolers were pretty active during the 1982-83 school year too, and they wrapped it all up with their very own graduation ceremony.


