On Friday, April 12, students in grades 5 and 6 received diplomas after successfully participating in Project DARE, an intensive sixteen week program designed to teach students strategies on how to say no to drugs. The projects instructor, Carlton County police officer Randy Flynn, provided concerned community members, staff, parents, Sheriff Dave Seboe, and administration with background information on the project.

Flynn and his students also performed a series of skits which emphasized strategies that they could use to turn-off drug pushers. The 8 strategies include:


1. Say no

8. Hang out with non-users




Project DARE was originally started in 1983 in Los Angeles. Currently, Flynn teaches DARE at Esko and the Ojibwe School. Various local merchants have donated funds to help purchase materials for the program. The donations purchase posters, buttons, etc.

Flynn's efforts also benefit students in many other ways including: building students self-esteem, students learn to respect police

officers, they learn to recognize possible abduction situations, and they learn important emergency telephone numbers.

Congratulations go out to the Junior class. Way to go, Juniors!














The idea of the secondary experiment was first brought up to improve the rapidly declining attendance of the secondary students. The idea was rooted in the following beliefs: that students learn better in heterogeneous groups, that inter-disciplinary curriculum is more effective, that collaboration between teachers provides better planning and therefore better teaching, that curriculum should be directed toward tasks that students can use learned information and apply it to, ie., outcomes based education, and that curriculum that is most closely connected to the real lives of students provides more meaning to instruction.

The plan for the final six weeks of school was to test these beliefs in a very practical manner. The plan called for teachers to pair up and develop curriculum that could be team taught for a daily class period of over two hours. This curriculum must include aspects of each subject area that the teachers teach, and be somehow measureable. The method of measurement was to be a daily journal for all students. In order for this to work, teachers were each asked to give up their preparation period.
















Ogichida Joins High School League Volleyball



The 1990-1991 girls basketball team finished the season with another great record of 12 wins and 5 losses. The Ogichida seemed to put the loss behind them and concentrated on the Christmas tournament at Red Lake. First round action between Red Lake and Fond du Lac ended with Fond du Lac advancing to the finals against Chief Bug. The basketball team shows improvement

The 1990-1991 Fond du Lac basketball team experienced a roller coaster season. After starting slowly, the Ogichida picked up momentum by winning the Red Lake Tournament. They defeated Chief Bug-O-Nay-Ghe-Shig in the opening round, and then held off White Earth to earn the Championship. All-Tournament team members for FDL were Ken Morrin and Rolland Makesroom. Ken was named tournament MVP. Strong performances were also given by Peter Diver, who scored well, David Gitzen, with defense, and Larry LaPointe in rebounding.

Then the team played in the Duluth Marshall Holiday tournament and lost to Silver Bay and Duluth Marshall. However, both games were relatively close, and the Ogichida showed they had the potential to stay with teams from public schools.





Depth proved to be a problem for the Ogichida however. The next three games, against Bug School, Nay-Ah-Shing, and Silver Bay were losses due largely to the absence of at least one starter in each game.

A home win over Floodwood was followed by losses to White Earth and Cook County. Then the Ogichida pulled together for their last two wins of the season, defeating Chisago Lakes Baptist and Bug school.

Disappointing losses to Silver Bay and Wrenshall damaged the morale for the Ogichida. Difficulty in preparing for Districts resulted in a 95-36 loss to Hermantown to end Fond du Lac's season.

Fond du Lac's 7-13 record was much improved over the three wins of the previous year. With Larry LaPointe and Spud Fairbanks as the only seniors, the Ogichida should return a good nucleus for the next year's team. In addition, freshmen Ira Aubid, Cheyenne Thompson, and Mike Peacock led a B-team that showed strong improvement during the year. It is possible the Ogichida could field a team loaded with seniors next season. As with any team, though, in order to be good, they will need to be dedicated to the team the entire season.
